AN UNFINISHED LOVE STORY: A PERSONAL HISTORY OF THE 1960s 12:30 – 1:45 PM | PAVILION

There is no finer voice to launch our 2025 festival than that of **DORIS KEARNS GOODWIN**, the revered and respected Pulitzer Prize-winning historian and biographer. Now she has written something thrilling and different: a moving memoir of her long marriage to Richard "Dick" Goodwin, a presidential speechwriter and close adviser to John F. Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson, the latter of whom he worked with to develop the Great Society. She will talk about the passion she and Dick shared for each other and for the country, and about the pivotal moments and central figures of the 1960s—the Kennedys, Johnsons, and Martin Luther King Jr. and tell us what still fills her with hope. Love stories don't get richer or more meaningful than this.

It is an extraordinary, sometimes overlooked story with deep resonance today. In conversation with **ANNE TAYLOR FLEMING**, Bingham will share the stories—and voices—of icons like Betty Friedan and Billie Jean King but also of the lesser-known heroes who were the heart and soul of the modern feminist movement that changed America forever.

In conversation with SVWC Literary Director **JOHN BURNHAM SCHWARTZ**, they will unpack their respective literary journeys, mapping for us some of the greatest obstacles confronted and deepest joys experienced along the way.

Purnell will share the details of Harriman's glittery and strategic life: how at age 20, as Churchill's beloved daughter-in-law, she became a "secret weapon" during World War II, and how, later in the United States, she hand-picked Bill Clinton and helped propel him to the presidency.

Shakespeare indelibly presented him as a study in youthful folly transformed into sober statesmanship. Jones considers Henry's reign "a case study in the art of leadership in a time of crisis." Join one of the most entertaining historians writing today for a deep—and deeply relevant—dive into the thrilling and unmissable life of England's greatest king.

There has been much focus on Lucy, but it turns out that Arnaz had a fascinating life of his own and made significant contributions to the entertainment industry, all of which we learn about in **TODD S. PURDUM**'s terrific new biography. Purdum, a veteran journalist and first-rate reporter, will talk about the book and trace Arnaz's journey from Cuban aristocracy to a world-class entertainer who helped spark the conga dance craze in America and revolutionized how sitcoms are filmed to this day.

A great student of military history, Stavridis provides a deeply intimate look at wartime life in the Navy and how one young officer comes of age in the toughest of proving grounds. He will talk with his editor, **SCOTT MOYERS**, Vice President and Publisher of Penguin Press, about the pleasures and challenges of writing fiction and how he manages to write such intricate and pulse-raising battle scenes.

Jonathan Blitzer

IMMIGRATION AND THE SOUTHERN BORDER 9:30 – 10:30 AM | 1ST BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

What has often been missing in our national conversations about immigration is fair-minded and in-depth reporting from the front. Now we have that in **JONATHAN BLITZER**'s brilliant new book, *Everyone Who Is Gone Is Here: The United States, Central America, and The Making of a Crisis,* a moving and comprehensive look at the humanitarian crisis at the southern border told through portraits of some of the migrants who risk everything to come here and the policymakers who determine their fate. Blitzer, a staff writer at The New Yorker, will talk about our country's tragically convoluted immigration policy and about the deep reporting that informs his book.

Oren Cass with Liaquat Ahamed

WHAT HAPPENED TO AMERICA'S WORKING CLASS AND WHAT TO DO ABOUT IT 9:30 – 10:30 AM | 1st BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

OREN CASS is a conservative economist and one of the most prominent advocates for policies aimed at improving the lives of the working class, those who have been hit hard in the last 30 years by globalization and free trade agreements. He is the founder and chief economist of the Washington-based nonprofit organization American Compass and the author of *The Once and Future Worker*. In conversation with Pulitzer Prize-winning author **LIAQUAT AHAMED**, Cass will explore the ideas and economic policies—from the efficacy of tariffs and industrial policy to a revitalized labor movement—intended to support the flourishing of America's working families.

During childhood summers in Louisiana, **ANDRE DUBUS III**'s grandfather taught him that men's work is hard. As an adult, whether tracking down a drug lord in Mexico as a bounty hunter or grappling with privilege while living with a rich girlfriend in New York City, Dubus worked at being a better human being. As he does in his brilliant collection of personal essays, Dubus will share moments of personal revelation with emotional generosity and stylistic grace, speaking from the heart about his successes, failures, triumphs, and pain. He'll reflect on the empowerment and shame he felt in keeping a gun and his decision, ultimately, to give it up—his violent youth and the challenges of fatherhood, the omnipresent expectations and contradictions of masculinity, the things writers remember and those they forget.

RUTH REICHL, one of our best-known and most well-loved food writers, is the author of five memoirs, including *Tender at the Bone* and *Save Me the Plums*. She is also a captivating novelist, and, as you might imagine, her fiction is full of many sensory pleasures. In her delightful new book, the protagonist Stella is left with an unusual inheritance: a one-way plane ticket and a note reading "Go to Paris." But Stella is hardly cut out for adventure; a traumatic childhood has confined her to the strict routines of her comfort zone. Reichl will talk to fellow food writer **ALEKSANDRA CRAPANZANO** about this novel that celebrates the city they both adore and the many reasons for living deliciously, taking chances, and finding your true home.

Both **NAYANTARA ROY**'s *The Magnificent Ruins* and **YAEL van der WOUDEN**'s *The Safekeep* are debut novels that were lauded around the globe last year, and both introduce us to complex, unforgettable young female protagonists who uncover dark secrets. In Roy's novel, an Indian American book editor in New York is summoned back to Kolkata to inherit her family's sprawling estate, leaving her to confront resentful family members who still live there, above all, her cold, mercurial mother. In *The Safekeep*, another house looms large, this one in the rural Dutch countryside in 1961, where Isabel is living in isolation, until her brother's girlfriend abruptly moves in, and the women tumble into a secret, obsessive affair, leading to a stunning plot twist that also manages to be a riveting exploration of the Holocaust. In conversation with **ANNE TAYLOR FLEMING**, Roy and van der Wouden will talk about the roads to their novels and about keeping faith with their literary ambitions.

THE BARN: THE SECRET HISTORY OF A MURDER IN MISSISSIPPI 9:30 – 10:30 AM | 1ST BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

WRIGHT THOMPSON's family farm in Mississippi is 23 miles from the site of one of the most notorious and consequential killings in American history—the murder of Emmett Till—yet he had to leave the state for college before he learned the first thing about it. Thompson's unforgettable new book, *The Barn*, is a shocking and revelatory account of that crime and how the truth was erased for so long. It is a story about property, and money, and power, and white supremacy. Thompson will bring to life the small group of dedicated people who have been engaged in the hard, fearful business of putting the killing floor of the barn on the map of the Delta and America and, in so doing, mapping the road this country must travel if we are to heal our oldest, deepest wound.

No two authors have done more to raise the profile and skewer the image of their home state than **CARL HIAASEN** and **DAVE BARRY**, residents of the great state of Florida, which has so often been the target of their sharp eyes and comedic gifts. Both men were columnists for the *Miami Herald* before becoming authors with their tales about the oddballs, hustlers, and politicians (or, more likely, all-in-one) who make up the citizenry of a place they both call home. The two old friends will share some of their favorite stories from their homeland and talk about how they love to make each other laugh.

Did you know that Edward III's last parliament invented impeachment? That cancel culture in universities actually began at Oxford and Paris in the 14th century? And then there's the Magna Carta, which supposedly limited the power of the monarchy and established the principle that everyone, including the king, is subject to the law. The great fun and scintillating interest of having in our midst British historian **DAN JONES**, host of the podcast *This Is History* and a riveting storyteller, will bring us intimately into the weirdly prescient past of the Middle Ages.

ERLING KAGGE is a world-leading Norwegian explorer, philosopher, and author, the first in history to reach the North Pole, South Pole, and the summit of Mt. Everest on foot. Blending memories from Kagge's expeditions, the book reckons with the pursuit of dreams and the challenging bonds between fathers and sons, while dramatically documenting the psychological toll of what it means to keep putting one foot in front of the other in the face of adversity. This is a story for anyone who's gazed out at the horizon and wondered what happens if you just keep walking. Kagge will talk with **WILLY WALKER**, All-American endurance athlete and host of the *Walker Webcast*, about his extraordinary journey across the North Pole and reflect on the beauty and fragility of our planet.

Her stories are translated into 35 languages and have won numerous awards, including the Edge Hill Prize, the William Trevor Prize, and are published in *The New Yorker* and *Best American Stories*. In conversation with **JENNY EMERY DAVIDSON**, Executive Director of The Community Library in Ketchum, Keegan will talk about short stories, hers and those of other writers she admires, and why she is drawn to the form and what makes the short story unique and magical.

In works of piercing beauty and heartrending grace, in poetry and prose, **OCEAN VUONG** has become one of his generation's most necessary and unforgettable literary voices. Now, with *The Emperor of Gladness*, he returns with a bighearted second novel.
